Let's Talk Aggression: A Discussion on the Classification of Aggression in Clinical Behaviour

Aggression is the dog behaviour problem most frequently referred to behaviour consultants. In addition, aggressive behaviour is a risk to people, other animals and the dog itself, given the potential for dogs displaying aggressive behaviour to be relinquished or euthanased. However, despite numerous publications on the subject, there remains little consistency in how the behaviour is defined and classified in the clinical sphere. This inconsistency means that it can be challenging to draw clinically relevant conclusions from published literature or to move the research field forward. This talk will explore some of the problems in the current approach to talking about aggression and make some suggestions as to how, as a profession, we can be clearer and more precise.
